Do you have a home office or work from home? Follow these electrical safety tips to keep you and your home safe from electrical hazards.









Avoid overloading outlets.



Unplug appliances when not in use to save energy and minimize the risk of shock and fire.



Regularly inspect electrical cords and extension cords for damage.



Extension cords should only be used on a temporary basis.



Never plug a space heater or fan into an extension cord or power strip.



Never run cords under rugs / carpets, doors, or windows.



Plug in smartly. Make sure cords do not become tripping hazards.



Keep papers and other potential combustibles at least three feet awa from space heaters and other heat sources.



Make sure you use proper wattage for lamps / lighting.



Make sure your home has smoke alarms. Test them monthly, change batteries yearly, and replace the unit every 10 years.

Board Report March 2020

- Approved February disbursements totaling \$626,070.94, 15 new member applications, and January 2020 construction in the amount of \$88,769.62.
- Reviewed financial results for the month of February, with -\$48,359 Operating Margins and -\$45,289 Total Margins year to date.
- There were no outages in February, with average YTD outage time per meter of .0041 hours.
- Three applications for discounted early retirement of capital credits to estates were approved with total capital credits of \$3,484.42 to be paid out at the net present value of \$1,729.34.
- 38 delinquent Accounts were processed for collection following the March 20th due date. The total amount owing on these accounts is \$15,157.99. Twenty-two of these accounts have remote disconnect capability.
- Policies on Nepotism and Net Metering were updated
- Discussion was held on the reschedule of the Annual Meeting. June 30 was set as a tentative date.
- CEO Ceaglske gave an update on the hiring of two linemen; COVID 19 response, voting delegates for upcoming meetings, retirement party for Mike, and member concerns and thank you notes.
